He spent 15 years at Tata Motors where he was the CEO and Managing Director and later Vice Chairman of the board. He led the acquisition of Jaguar Land Rover, UK; Tata Daewoo, South Korea and established Tata Motors, Thalland and other companies which helped increase the revenue from \$1.5 to \$39 bn. Under his watch, Tata Motors launched Tata Ace which nearly doubled the size of the commercial vehicle market in India and Nano small car, a case study in Innovation. He was Chairman of several companies like Tata Advanced Materials, Hispano Carrocera, Spain, Tata Motors European Technical Centre, U.K., Tata Marco Polo, Tata Thailand, Tata Daewoo etc. and Director of Tata Industries, Voltas, Vedanta Ltd. (one of the largest natural resource companies in the world) and Jaguar Land Rover etc.

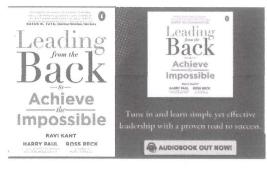
